**ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL EMERGENCY RELIEF
(ESSER II) AGREEMENT**

This agreement ("Agreement") is made by and between the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania ("Commonwealth"), through its Pennsylvania Department of Education ("Department"), and Spring Grove Area SD located at 100 E College Ave, Spring Grove, PA 17362, ("Grantee").

The Department, created by Section 201 of the Administrative Code of 1929, as amended, 71 P.S. § 61, is the State Education Agency responsible for administration of grant programs pursuant to the General Appropriation Acts and the Public School Code of 1949, as amended, 24 P.S. § 1-101 et seq. and has been awarded funds by the US Department of Education for Elementary and Secondary Emergency Relief (ESSER II) programs under the, P.L. 116-136. Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act, Public Law 116-260.

The parties, intending to be legally bound, agree as follows:

1. Pursuant to this Agreement, Grantee will receive funds in the amount of \$1,806,743.00. The grant shall be used to defray program costs incurred from March 13, 2020 to September 30, 2023.
2. The Agreement shall become effective on the date it is fully executed by all required parties and shall terminate on September 30, 2023, unless terminated earlier in accordance with the terms hereof.
3. Grantee shall furnish all qualified personnel, facilities, materials and other services and in consultation with the Department, provide the services described in Appendix B.
4. This Agreement is comprised of the following Appendices which are hereby incorporated by reference into this Agreement:

INTRODUCTION

Under the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief II Fund (ESSER II), authorized by the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act, the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) awards grants to School Districts and Charter Schools to address the impact that Novel Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) has had, and continues to have, on elementary and secondary schools across the state.

Please note: ESSER II funds **cannot** be used for: 1) subsidizing or offsetting executive salaries and benefits of individuals who are not employees of the LEAs, or 2) expenditures related to state or local teacher or faculty unions or associations. Please explain how the LEA will determine its most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19. (3000 characters max)

The Spring Grove Area School District has spent the 2020-21 school year evaluating our distance learning program in real time and will continue to review and debrief this experience. We are working to determine educational needs on both the system scale and the individual scale. ESSER CARES funding will help us to address needs in both domains. Educational needs will be prioritized to address our ability to deliver distance learning effectively as well as to meet individual needs through a distance learning model.

Please explain the LEA(s) proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff. (3000 characters max)

The Spring Grove Area School District is prepared to utilize ESSER CARES funding upon approval of this application. HVAC and PPE purchases will be made in the summer of 2021 and will be in ready for the start of the 2021-2022 school year. Summer Learning will start in June 2021 – August 2021 to address learning loss and meals will be provided to these students. Mental health training will start the summer of 2021 and continue throughout the 2021-22 year. Preparation for the opening of schools will include a special emphasis on identifying and addressing educational needs in the fall.

Please explain the extent to which the LEA intends to use ESSER II funds to promote remote learning. (3000 characters max)

The Spring Grove Area School District will use the ESSR fund allocation to maintain and improve our capacity to deliver distance learning through technology in a variety of ways. This capacity will be beneficial to our distance learning students that are in our distance learning classes or our Spring Grove Flex students. First additional investments in hardware, software, connectivity, and applications all allow the school district to continue to grow our ability to transition to distance learning if necessary, seamlessly and effectively, building upon the lessons learned during the 2020-21 year as well as continue to support our Spring Grove Flex

Academy. Second, the district has contracted for a feasibility study looking at the viability, use cases, and costs of a private LTE system. This will be focused on a proof of concept at Paradise Elementary School (highest percentage of Free and Reduced) being the first step towards a scalable solution for the school district or region. This study will review the use cases and deployment scenarios for a private LTE system that will support student connectivity, as well as investigate the other use cases that could be used by the school district, or community at large. The feasibility study will establish a system design for a proof-of-concept deployment, estimated costs of that POC, a testing plan to validate the POC, and the steps to be accomplished to scale the system to a school district wide solution or beyond.

Please describe how the LEA intends to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services. (3000 characters max)

The Spring Grove Area School District will use the ESSR fund allocation for a Summer School/Summer Camp offered to Spring Grove students is to provide additional support to Traditional Learning and Distance Learning scholars who have experienced difficulty in core content areas during the latter part of 2019-2020 and the current 2020-2021 school years. Spring Grove Area School District focuses on the “whole child.” We are dedicated to continuing the mindset of “Learning without Limits” that supports our mission and vision for all students K12. By creating a bridge of learning that extends beyond the traditional school year, we will be enabling our students, particularly those experiencing a need for greater assistance, to continue their school-based learning throughout the year. The method and delivery of summer support to our students will vary based upon developmental levels, age, and content areas. Incorporating this opportunity for our students will not only focus on learning gaps that may have occurred during the 2020-2021 school year but will also assist in minimizing the loss of learning that occurs during the summer months when students are often less engaged in structured educational activities.

Please describe the LEA(s) proposed procedures for evaluating local COVID-19 impacts in relation to education programming and delivery. (3000 characters max)

Areas of emphasis should include:

- Documenting learning loss associated with extended school closure;
- Outlining the development of local continuity of education plans over the course of emergency response efforts; and
- Detailing supports for vulnerable student populations and families.

The Spring Grove Area School District used a variety of tools to identify students who may have experienced learning losses. The Spring Grove Elementary Schools (K-4) evaluated learning loss through the Acadience Software Platform to identify students at risk for reading and math difficulties and determine the skills to target for instructional support. The Spring Grove Area Intermediate School (5-6) is holding its first Summer Camp Program for students that have experienced learning loss associated with the extended school closure from COVID-19. Students are one-to-one with iPads which allows our teachers to zoom, and work on the Schoology Platform for continuity of education. Hot spots are also provided to those families in need. Breakfast and lunch continue to be free of charge to all students for the coming school year. The Spring Grove Area Middle School (7-8), evaluated learning loss by the results of

student PSSA, Keystone, and CDT test scores. Also to help combat learning loss, a summer school program for students who struggled academically was offered. At the High School learning loss associated with extended school closure with was documented with Keystone and CDT Data, in addition to course grades were used to measure students' performance. The high school saw an increase in the number of course failures. This led to a greater need for summer school. As a result, we double the number of teachers staffing summer school courses. We also offered Social Studies during summer school for the first time. The high school ran a Wednesday bootcamp for students for IEPs. These students stayed after school for additional academic supports. The Spring Grove Area School District partnered with True North for increased, school based counseling services. The high school also ran an after school study hall for students who needed to stay after school for extracurricular activities. These students did not have rides to and from home and would not have been able to attend extracurricular activities without the supervised study hall.

Please describe the LEA core set of strategies that will be used to guide local investment of ESSER II funding, associated with short-range (i.e., remainder of the 2020-21 school year) and long-range (2021-22 and 2022-2023 school years) timelines. (3000 characters max)

These strategies may entail the establishment, scale-up, refinement, or evaluation of remote learning, as well as strategies for school-based teaching and learning responsive to conditions related to the pandemic. The Spring Grove Area School District traditional learning environment will be enhanced utilizing a variety of learning technologies to provide the highest quality learning experience to our in-person learners. Teachers will be trained to maximize the use of the iPad as a way to enhance instruction and assessment. Teachers will have a comprehensive digital home base that will allow them to meet the needs of all learners through differentiation and individualization. Students and parents will have the opportunity to choose to engage with the curriculum in non-traditional methods through the district's SGFlex online program. Synchronous and asynchronous options will be available to students K-12 (as appropriate) to respond to the specific needs of our families.

The Spring Grove Area School District will use a part of the ESSR fund allocation for a Summer School/Summer Camp to be offered to Spring Grove students and will provide additional support to Traditional Learning and Distance Learning scholars who have experienced difficulty in core content areas during the latter part of 2019-2020 and the current 2020-2021 school years.

2. **TERMS OF PAYMENT:**

- a. All grants are placed on a system of scheduled payments to provide operating funds during the period of the Agreement. Monthly payments are determined by dividing the approved amount by the number of months during the term of the Agreement. Payments will be initiated by the Comptroller's Office after arrival of each fully executed Agreement.
- b. Grantee shall implement a cash management system that will ensure that only the minimum amount of cash required to effectively operate the program is requested and/or kept on hand. Failure to implement and maintain such a system can result in the Grantee being suspended until an adequate cash management system has been implemented.
- c. During the life of this Agreement, unless otherwise provided in Program Guidelines, Grantee shall submit the following financial reports to the Comptroller's Office or the Department:
 1. Reconciliation of Cash on Hand Quarterly Report PDE Form No. 2030, and
 2. Final Expenditure Report.
- d. Grantee will conform to all policies and guidelines cited in the Department's individual program Policies and Procedures and/or instructions associated with the Reconciliation of Cash on Hand Quarterly Report, and Final Expenditure Report concerning the financial reports described in Paragraph 2(c), above.
- e. The Department reserves the right to disapprove any expenditures by the Grantee that are not in accordance with this Agreement.

3. **REPORTING:**

Grantee shall submit any required program and or fiscal reports that are designated by the Department and/or federal awarding agencies for the purpose of determining program outcomes and compliance. Due dates and reporting requirements will be announced by the Department.

Any unexpended funds remaining at the end of the grant period must be returned to the Department of Education.

4. **FUNDING LEVEL: THE TOTAL COST TO THE COMMONWEALTH UNDER THIS AGREEMENT SHALL NOT EXCEED THE AMOUNT SET FORTH IN THE AGREEMENT.**

Payment of that amount is contingent upon the availability of Program funds and appropriations sufficient to pay the total costs. Any funds provided to the Grantee under this Agreement may only be used in accordance with this Agreement.

- a. **FUNDING INCREASE** – If the Commonwealth determines that additional Federal or State program funds are available for use under this Agreement, the Commonwealth may at its sole discretion increase the approved program cost. Such increases will be made in accordance with paragraph 5 ("Funding Adjustments").
- b. **DECREASE** – The Commonwealth reserves the right, at its sole discretion, to reduce the total cost of this

Agreement when the Federal or State funds appropriated by the U.S. Congress and/or State Legislature are less than anticipated by the Commonwealth after Execution of this Agreement hereunder; **or** the funds appropriated are later unavailable due to a reduction or reservation in the appropriation. Such decreases will be made in accordance with paragraph 5 ("Funding Adjustments").

- c. **UNEXPENDED FUNDS** – Grantee understands and agrees that funds which remain unexpended at the end of the term of the Agreement or upon termination of the Agreement shall be returned to the Commonwealth within sixty (60) days of the project's ending date or termination date along with the submission of the Final Completion Report and/or Final Expenditure Report, depending on the applicable program requirements.
- d. **WITHHOLDING OF FUNDING** – Without limitation of any other remedies to which it is entitled hereunder or at law, the Commonwealth shall have the right to withhold the funding granted under this Agreement, in whole or in part, for any of the following reasons, without limitation:
 - 1. failure of Grantee to fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations hereunder;
 - 2. violation of laws, regulations or policies applicable to the grant or to the implementation of the project funded under this Agreement; and
 - 3. misuse of funds, mismanagement, criminal activity or malfeasance in the implementation of this Agreement.

5. FUNDING ADJUSTMENTS:

Funding Adjustments may be made for the following reasons and in the following manner:

a. **Funding Increase:**

- 1. The Commonwealth shall notify the Grantee in writing of any funding increases under this Agreement.
- 2. Upon receipt of this notice the Grantee shall revise and submit to the Commonwealth a revised Program Summary Budget and if necessary, any revised pages of the Narrative which shall reflect the increase of funds.
- 3. Funding increases will take effect upon Commonwealth's receipt and approval of the revised documents, which shall be incorporated in and made part of this Agreement.

b. **Funding Decrease:**

- 1. The Commonwealth shall notify the Grantee in writing of any funding decreases.
- 2. Funding decreases will be effective upon receipt by the Grantee of the Commonwealth's funding decrease notice.
- 3. Funding decrease notices shall be incorporated in and made part of this Agreement.

c. **Transfer of Funds Among Cost Categories and/or Object Codes:**

Any transfer of funds among cost functions and/or object codes must be made consistent with the applicable Program Guidelines.
