SUBJECT: Disposal of Technology Equipment

In accordance with Board Policy #706.1, Board approval is required for the disposal of obsolete/surplus equipment. The attached listing is a compilation of iPads we are recommending to the Board for its consideration to declare as surplus to take advantage of the remaining resale value by selecting a reseller to purchase the iPads.

These iPads are available for resale as a result of the unit refresh that took place over the summer for grades K-4. Our plan is to solicit quotes from electronic recycling vendors to purchase these retired assets. The units have been wiped and restored to their factory settings in preparation for the sale.

Following review at the November 14th DSF, the Administration will seek Board approval at the November 28th Voting Meeting to declare the equipment as surplus for resale, as listed. Accelerated Budget Opt Out Resolution Certifying Tax Rate Within Inflation Index (and No Need to Comply with Act 1 Accelerated Budget Procedures) 2023-2024 School Year

Background. Act 1 § 311(a), 53 P.S. § 6926.311(a), requires an accelerated budget adoption timeline and procedure unless a school district, no later than 110 days before the primary election, adopts a resolution containing the certifications incorporated in this resolution. The deadline this year is January 31, 2023. After adoption of a resolution containing such certifications, § 311(d) authorizes a school district to comply with pre-Act 1 budget adoption rules as set forth in School Code § 687, 24 P.S. § 6-687. The School Board has reviewed the school district preliminary budget or has other information sufficient to make a determination that the budget for the next fiscal year can be funded based on maintaining current tax rates or increasing taxes by an amount less than or equal to the Act 1 index. In lieu of the Act 1 budget adoption timeline and procedure, the School Board wishes to make the required certifications and comply with pre-Act 1 budget adoption rules.

RESOLVED, that the Board of School Directors of the Spring Grove Area School District, makes the following unconditional certifications:

- 1. The school district's various tax levies and other revenue sources will be sufficient to balance the school district final budget for the next fiscal year (2023-24) based on maintaining current tax rates or increasing tax rates by an amount less than or equal to the Act 1 index applicable to the school district as calculated by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. This conclusion is based on the school district preliminary budget or other information available to the School Board.
- 2. The applicable index for the next fiscal year is 5.5%, and the School Board will not for the next fiscal year increase the rate of its real estate tax, or any other tax for the support of public education, by an amount that exceeds the applicable index.
- 3. The School Board has to date and, in the future, will comply with the rules set forth in School Code § 687 for adoption of the school district proposed and final budgets for the next fiscal year.
- 4. The School Board understands that the school district will not be eligible to use Act 1 referendum exceptions for the next fiscal year.

SUBJECT: High School Auditorium Upgrade

As outlined in a Board memo last February, the District has been working on lighting and sound upgrades to the high school auditorium. This upgrade follows other lighting and sound enhancements completed in the past few years for the athletic facilities in the stadium, natatorium, and gymnasium. Since the high school was built, very few upgrades have been made to the auditorium.

At that time, we estimated the cost of the project using three tiers of upgrades based on the needs of our performing arts programs and the anticipated use of the facility:

- 1. Minimum \$380,000
- 2. Better \$615,000
- 3. Best \$1,040,000

After review of various proposals, the district has selected Stray Pro, a vendor on the COSTARS state cooperative purchasing program, to perform these upgrades at a cost not-to-exceed \$559,619. The contract for this project is included with board packet materials. Their proposal satisfies all the criteria of the middle, "Better," tier while coming in lower than the initially estimated cost.

The upgrades in this project will solve inadequacies of the current sound and lighting systems, including bringing the space up to code, and will address several safety issues. The improvements will also result in energy savings from LED lighting throughout the stage and auditorium seating and lower annual maintenance costs. Additionally, sound improvements will cover all seating areas and better serve the existing needs of the music and theatrical programs that use this space.

Finally, because of this project, some of the existing lighting in the high school auditorium can be repurposed for use on the middle school stage, further enhancing the amenities of that site.

With Board approval on November 28th, equipment can be ordered, and shop drawings created in order for the project to be completed during the summer of 2023. This project will be funded using monies in the Technology Budget available from ESSER funds, covering costs in both the current fiscal year and in 2023-2024.

SUBJECT: Informational Item / Sale of East College Avenue Property

to Spring Grove Borough

In April 2021, the Board of School Directors approved a Purchase Agreement with the Spring Grove Borough to sell the vacant tract of land located at College Avenue, Spring Grove through an agreement with the Borough for the purchase, contingent upon certain conditions. One such contingency is that within ninety (90) days of the Spring Grove Borough obtaining a grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR), the Spring Grove Area School District shall prepare final subdivision plans to be submitted to the Spring Grove Borough to separate the parking lot from the parcel. The cost associated with the preparation and approval of the subdivision plan is to be shared equally.

The Spring Grove Borough has recently notified the district that they have been awarded the open space grant from DCNR. This memorandum is to inform board members of this "next step" to complete the subdivision of the property, and there is no action required by board members at this time. Settlement of the property is to be within sixty (60) days of the final approval by the Spring Grove Borough of the subdivision plan. We anticipate bringing the final proposed sale agreement to the School Board in early 2023 for consideration of approval.

SUBJECT: 2023-2024 Proposed School Calendar

As in prior years, we have developed the calendar for the next school year following our typical internal process that includes input from staff and Leadership Team members. Option C is our recommendation for the Board's review and consideration at the November 14th Directors' Study Forum.

OPTION C includes a start date for staff of August 21, 2023; a start date for students in grades K, 5, 7, and 9 of August 23, 2023; a start date for all remaining students in grades 1-12 of August 24, 2023; an ending date for students of May 30, 2024; and an ending date for staff and *firm graduation date of May 31, 2024*.

As was approved the previous year by the Board, we are again recommending the earlier start date for all kindergarten, fifth, seventh, and ninth grade students as a benefit to entering new schools. Four early dismissal days for students have been incorporated into the calendar to allow time for professional staff members to engage in professional development activities, and to conduct critical data analysis and discuss strategies to address students' needs.

In keeping with previous years, we have attached a second option, OPTION B for the 2023-2024 School Calendar, reflecting the same start date as presented with OPTION C, but ending the school year one week later with graduation on June 7, 2024. A third option (OPTION A) was considered, but not preferred by staff and Leadership Team members.

The Launch Program will again follow the approved School Calendar for K-12 students.

Following consensus of the Board, the recommended option of the regular School Calendar will move forward for consideration of approval at the November 28th Regular Voting Meeting.

Study Topic Name:	DRESS AND GROOMING - STUDENT HANDBOOK AND POLIC
Recommendation(s)	Update the Student/Parent Handbook Dress Code requirements to reflect proposed changes as outlined in the attached.
Background Information Study Topic Objective(s) Process Used	In March 2022, the Board of School Directors tasked the administration with reviewing and updating the district's existing student dress code. A Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) was convened to review current language, research and investigate options for consideration, and develo and recommend updates to the dress code. The CAC was encouraged to collect feedback from the stakeholders by inviting students, parents, staf and legal counsel to provide different perspectives. The CAC, comprised of 19 individuals, met on five separate occasions to review information, share input, discuss options and consider best recommendations for implementation.
Benchmarks/Research Findings	Research included visiting nine local school districts' websites to access board policy and student/parent handbook language related to a dress code. The information was archived and shared with all CAC members for consideration. Chris Harris, Attorney with Stock and Leader, shared a presentation on dress code from a legal perspective. Selected students from the SGAHS were welcomed to present comments from their viewpoint.
Benefits to Recommendation(s)	Provides clarity, consistency, and specificity to students and parents regarding appropriate dress and grooming at school. Provides clarity, consistency, and specificity to requirements for teachers and administrators to enforce the dress code and affirms the dress code referral and discipline process.
Any Potential Drawbacks to Recommendation(s)	The enforcement of the updated dress code may continue to cause a distraction to building administrators and teachers from the educational mission and curricular/administrative priorities at the building level.

The CAC recommends that revisions to the dress code language in the student/parent handbook go into effect after board approval (with the new calendar year) and be included as a supplemental document to the existing handbook. CORE SECTION OF THE 22-23 HANDBOOK: Hyperlinks will be used in **all building-specific sections** to take parent/student to **the** following **CORE SECTION** language:

Dress and Grooming (Policy #221)

An important component of our educational process is teaching students the importance of healthy grooming, proper dress for the occasion, and good hygiene. All parents/guardians are asked to cooperate with the Spring Grove Area School District in helping students develop pride in their appearance.

GENERAL GUIDELINES

- Students should use proper discretion with respect to school dress.
- Clothing should be clean and free of suggestive or vulgar printing or pictures.
- Hoods on any apparel are not to be worn in the school building(s) during the regular school day.
- Clothing with signs, symbols, or slogans depicting alcohol, drugs, tobacco, vaping, or profanity, in print or in pictures, is not permitted.
- Clothing that exhibits slogans, phrases, pictures, or symbols that have a sexual connotation, contain a double entendre (meaning), or reference violence or matters determined to be a hazard to health or safety, is not permitted.
- Clothing that materially and substantially interferes or disrupts the educational process, activities, or work of the school (including a student's educational performance), is not permitted.
- Clothing that interferes with the rights of other students is considered inappropriate school attire and is not permitted.
- Clothing that reveals undergarments is inappropriate and may not be worn during the regular school day.
- Clothing which materially and substantially interferes or disrupts the educational process by style or appearance is not permitted.

Examples of clothing that are considered materially and substantially disruptive to the educational setting and/or hazardous include:

- Transparent/sheer clothing
- o Sagging pants where the undergarments are exposed
- o Tube tops/halter tops/strapless tops/shirts without sides or low-cut sides
- O Shirts/Tops that, when standing, the hem of the shirt does not meet the waist of the pant/skirt/bottom
- O Skirts/shorts/dresses that reveal any part of the buttocks
- o Costumes (unless promoted as a spirit day)
- Chains, jewelry, or any type of clothing or accessories, which potentially create a dangerous or materially and substantially disruptive situation, are not permitted.
- Hair styles, body art, and/or cosmetics, which materially and substantially interferes or disrupts the educational process by appearance, are not permitted.
- Sunglasses are not to be worn within the school setting unless medically necessary.

ELEMENTARY LEVEL (GR. K-6) SPECIFIC

Students should be dressed appropriately for the weather. Elementary school students participate in scheduled outdoor recess periods when/as the weather permits. Students will engage in physical activity, such as running and jumping on black top areas, as well as grass and chipped mulch areas.

Elementary students also participate in scheduled physical education classes during the cycled school day. For the safety of our elementary level students, students must wear safe and appropriate footwear, such as sneakers and closed-toed shoes.

• Sandals, high-heels, slippers, and flip flops are not considered safe and appropriate for physical activity. Students wearing footwear not appropriate for physical activity will not be permitted to participate in certain activities on the playground during recess period.

SECONDARY LEVEL (GR. 7-12) SPECIFIC

Hats, headbands, bandanas, or other head coverings (excluding hoods) are permitted to be worn during the school day at the secondary (7-12) level if they adhere to the general guidelines listed above regarding clothing.

Students should be dressed appropriately for the weather. Secondary level students participate in scheduled outdoor classes when the weather permits. Per individual schedule, students may participate in physical education classes, science labs, weight room activities, etc. For that reason, students must wear safe and appropriate footwear during such activities, such as sneakers and closed-toed shoes.

 Sandals, high-heels, slippers, and flip flops are not considered safe and appropriate footwear for physical activity, science labs, weight room activities, etc. Students wearing footwear not appropriate for the activity/class will not be permitted to participate.

REFERRAL PROCESS/DISCIPLINARY ACTION FOR STUDENTS K-12:

- 1) Students wearing prohibited dress will be referred to the office.
- 2) Referred students will be offered an opportunity to correct their attire, in an agreed-upon manner and time frame.
- 3) Students who do not comply will be subject to disciplinary action.

Final determination of acceptable dress and grooming rests with the Principal or Assistant Principal (or designee).

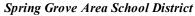

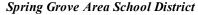
