Course Description

Art 1 is a full year course open to all students in grades 9, 10, 11, and 12. There are no prerequisites for this course. Students will do in-depth study of the elements of design. Emphasis is placed on developing skills in the foundation of drawing through various drawing exercises, including still-life drawings, and sketchbook assignments. A variety of materials will be used to study the various ways one can communicate ideas artistically. Students will also spend time studying topics such as art history and art criticism. This is a foundation year course.
