# **Course Description**

For this course, students will read and analyze American literature from the Early American Period through the Contemporary Period. This literature will be the vehicle for building college-preparatory skills including note-taking, close reading and analysis, written expression, discussion, and research skills. The course will also emphasize practice for the Reading and Writing sections of the SAT. Students can expect to create at least one research project. Independent reading will also be assigned.
