Course Title: Criminal Justice Length of Course: 15 cycles

Course Description

This course will examine the criminal justice system. Main themes covered in this course include crime in America, policing, prison life, court structure, mock trials, drugs and crime, juvenile justice, and crime scene investigations that affect the United States. A unit entitled "Police Academy" will analyze the various ways law enforcement works to provide protection to our country. Students will become law enforcement agents in the criminal justice world. Active-learning, problem-solving, and decision-making opportunities throughout the course allow students to get involved as citizens and pre-professionals. The course will include a real-life crime scene using deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA) profiling techniques and feature topics such as ethics, diversity, careers, profiling killers, and criminal justice in today's world.
