Course Description

United States History 2 Honors is an examination of the social, cultural, political, intellectual, and economic movements that have shaped American History from 1900 to the present. Students will gain an appreciation of America's role in a global society with an emphasis on its historical involvement in the following eras of United States History in the 20th and 21st centuries: Progressivism, Imperialism and Nationalism, World War I and its Implications, the "Roaring Twenties," the Great Depression, America and World War II, the Cold War, Civil Rights Movement & the Great Society, an Era of Social Change, Vietnam War, An Age of Limits—Nixon, Ford, and Carter Years, Reagan-Bush and the End of the Cold War, the Clinton Years, September 11, 2001 and the Global War on Terror, and Current Political, Social, and Economic movements experienced in the early 21st century. In addition to meeting the goals of the required United States History curriculum, students will demonstrate their knowledge at *an advanced level* through a variety of critical thinking and writing assessments.
